June 17, 1968 - October 29, 2024

Matthew Bradford Eppard passed away October 29, 2024 in Vancouver WA. He was 56 years old.

"Brad" was born on June 17, 1968 in Charlotte, NC, nine minutes before his 'younger' sister, Michelle, and the second of 4 children.

If you spent any time at all with Brad, he likely showed you pictures and bragged about the two people most important to him, his 2 beautiful daughters, Samantha Grace and Sylvia Joy. They were the absolute joy of his life!

Brad was a beloved father, son, brother, nephew, uncle and friend. He was perhaps best known for his sense of humor and his truly infectious laugh.

Brad graduated from White River High School in 1986 and graduated from Central Washington University with a Bachelor of Science degree in Biology. In 1993, Brad started his career as a Fishery Biologist with the National Marine Fisheries Service where he studied adult and juvenile salmon passage at dams on the Snake and Columbia Rivers. In 2005, he transferred to the US Army Corps of Engineers, Portland District, where he became a study leader, and eventually the team lead for conducting fish and dam interaction studies. He was a key participant in developing new micro-technologies for conducting

fisheries related passage research, co-authored over 60 scientific journal articles, and presented data at numerous regional, national and international fisheries conferences.

Brad had a deep faith in Jesus and we find comfort in knowing he is now with his Savior. Through the years, he enjoyed hobbies of golf, fishing and woodworking and he enjoyed spending time with family, especially his girls. He will be greatly missed!

Brad's family includes his beloved daughters, Samantha and Sylvia; mother, Nancy Youngdahl; father, Rod Eppard; Uncle Doug & Aunt Barbara Peterson, Uncle Doug & Aunt Andre Peek; siblings, Mike (Pattie), Michelle Eppard, Greg (Branden Fuller) and more nieces, nephews, family and loved ones than he could count.
